



Introduction to state parks

DCR Mission

Conserve, protect, enhance and advocate wise use of the Commonwealth's unique natural, historical, recreational, scenic and cultural resources.

State Park Mission

To conserve the natural, scenic, historic and cultural resources of the Commonwealth & provide recreational & educational opportunities consistent with the good stewardship of these lands, waters & facilities that leave them unimpaired for future generations.





History of Virginia State Parks The first 6 parks...out of the Depression

1936: Virginia opens a system of 6 state parks...most were a combination of donated land plus state funds for development





The System Grows

1940's through 1980's:

A steady procession of new parks acquired and developed through a combination of funds: donations, federal grant money and state capital development







Voters support more growth and development

1990's through present: Two major bond referendums in 1992 and 2002 funded more than \$214 million in funds; 5 new parks and land for 6 more; 31 natural areas; 296 building projects: campgrounds, cabins, support facilities, etc.

We continue to acquire lands, largely by donation or discounted sales ... the challenge is to find the development funds.



Today's Virginia State Park System

40 parks, 4 under development

75,895 acres

34 historic register sites

662 miles of trails

32 parks with overnight facilities

11 day use parks


29 visitor centers

99 picnic shelters

11 swimming beaches

Park Services and Facilities

Each park has a unique set of facilities, activities and services

Day Uses: hiking, swimming, picnicking, boating, bicycling, horse riding, canoeing, rafting
Overnight: cabins and camping
Programs, education, interpretation
Conference and meeting facilities









The relevancy of state parks in the 21st century & beyond

Parks are a part of the Community: Friends Groups, volunteerism, economic benefit.

Solutions to many of today's challenges: "Nature Deficit Disorder", daily stress, and the need for affordable recreational opportunities.

The need for parks is greater today than it has ever been ... places to reconnect to nature, to be with families and friends, and to re-establish personal well being.



First Landing State Park

One of the most visited Virginia state parks with over 700,000 visits per year.

Total acreage of 2,888 acres



The Park Name

Original name of Seashore State Park was changed to First Landing State Park in 1997 to reflect the history of English colonists with the Virginia Company landing on the shore of the Chesapeake Bay in 1607 prior to settling in Jamestown







Over 450 educational programs conducted for over 14,000 people.

Over 100 school presentations and field trips enlightening over 3,000 students.











- Over 19 miles of hiking trails.
- 1.5 miles of beach along the Chesapeake Bay.

- 20 overnight cabins.
- 205 campsites.
- 4 overnight yurts.

Financial




Annual Operating Budget - \$1,125,000 Annual Revenues - \$2,540,000

Master Plan Process




State Park Master Planning Code

§ 10.1-200.1. State park master planning

- (i) for all existing state parks, (ii) substantial land acquisitions,
 (iii) prior to major improvements
- A guide for the development, utilization and management of its <u>natural</u>, <u>cultural</u> and <u>historic resources</u>
- Developed in stages with public input
- Required to be updated every 10 years



First Landing State Park Master Plan



PHASE 1

- Renovate 20 cabin interiors and exteriors
- Replace Archer, Kendall, Wingfield and Percy Campground Bathhouses
- Construct 1-six bedroom lodge and 4-three bedroom cabins
- Construct pole shed in maintenance area for resource management storage
- Replace staff residence at 2565 Sheltered Woods Lane
- Enlarge and renovate staff residence at 2527 Sheltered Woods Lane
- Replace culvert with bridge on Cape Henry Extension Trail
- Upgrade campground roads (3 miles), including two lane traffic at contact station/entrance
- Replace Susan Constant, Godspeed, and Discovery dune crossovers in campgrounds
- Demolish amphitheater, and add a large screened shelter (capacity 120) with a fireplace

Blowup of developed area




PHASE 2

- Upgrade 64th Street Boat Ramp including road, parking, dock, ramp and site drainage
- Replace comfort station in picnic area.
- Upgrade campgrounds with sewer and campsite improvements.
 (205 sites)
- Reconfigure the existing parking at the Chesapeake Bay Center to increase capacity
- Upgrade parking lot near the Narrows
- Reconfigure 64th Street entrance with signage, new gate, fence removal and road widening
- Construct parking (40 spaces) at Trail Center



First Landing State Park Master Plan

Blowup of eastern area of park (The Narrows)



PHASE 3

- Replace the 64th street contact station, include a rest room
- Upgrade Cape Henry Trail from Kendall St. to the Trail Center (2 miles)
- Expand playground in picnic area
- Construct small picnic shelter at Trail Center
- Add bike / pedestrian path along 64th Street (3 miles)
